## Luke 7

King James Version (KJV)

- **7** Now when he had ended all his sayings in the audience of the people, he entered into Capernaum.
- <sup>2</sup>And a certain <u>centurion</u>'s servant, who was dear unto him, was sick, and ready to die. (A centurion was a Roman colonel who was over eight hundred soldiers. This sick man is his slave)
- <sup>3</sup> And when he heard of Jesus, he sent unto him the elders of the Jews, beseeching him that he would come and heal his servant. (He had faith in Jesus)
- <sup>4</sup>And when they came to Jesus, they besought him instantly, saying, That he was worthy for whom he should do this: (The centurion was a good man)
- <sup>5</sup> For he loveth our nation, and he hath built us a synagogue. (He built the Jews a synagogue)
- <sup>6</sup>Then Jesus went with them. And when he was now not far from the house, the centurion sent friends to him, saying unto him, Lord, trouble not thyself: for I am not worthy that thou shouldest enter under my roof: (He shows humility before God)
- <sup>7</sup>Wherefore neither thought I myself worthy to come unto thee: but say in a word, and my servant shall be healed. (This shows faith)
- <sup>8</sup> For I also am a man set under authority, having under me soldiers, and I say unto one, Go, and he goeth; and to another, Come, and he cometh; and to my servant, Do this, and he doeth it.
- When Jesus heard these things, he marvelled at him, and turned him about, and said unto the people that followed him, I say unto you, I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel. (This Roman had more faith in Jesus than the Jews did)
- <sup>10</sup> And they that were sent, returning to the house, found the servant whole that had been sick. (Jesus had healed him)
- <sup>11</sup> And it came to pass the day after, that he went into a city called <u>Nain</u>; and many of his disciples went with him, and much people. (Nain = beauty)

## NOTE: (Nain is near to Endor, where the witch was; that Saul had sought out in the Book of Samuel)

- <sup>12</sup> Now when he came nigh to the gate of the city, behold, there was a dead man carried out, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow: and much people of the city was with her. (She would no longer have anyone to care for her)
- <sup>13</sup> And when the Lord saw her, he had compassion on her, and said unto her, Weep not. (God has compassion for us when we are suffering)
- <sup>14</sup> And he came and touched the bier: and they that bare him stood still. And he said, Young man, I say unto thee, Arise. (HE touched the brier, not the deceased, as per Jewish law)
- <sup>15</sup> And he that was dead sat up, and began to speak. And he delivered him to his mother. (Jesus brings life. Satan brings death)
- <sup>16</sup> And there came a <u>fear</u> on all: and they glorified God, saying, That a great prophet is risen up among us; and, That God hath visited his people. (fear = reverence, awe)

## (Jesus is Immanuel = God with us) see Isaiah-7:14

- <sup>17</sup> And this rumour of him went forth throughout all Judaea, and throughout all the region round about.
- <sup>18</sup> And the disciples of <u>John</u> shewed him of all these things. (This is <u>John the Baptist</u>)
- <sup>19</sup> And John calling unto him two of his disciples sent them to Jesus, saying, Art thou he that should come? or look we for another? (Is this about the Advent of God or will there be another? better translation)

(John knew exactly who Jesus was when he baptized Him)

## NOTE: (There will be a Second Advent in the end days)

<sup>20</sup> When the men were come unto him, they said, John Baptist hath sent us unto thee, saying, Art thou he that should come? or look we for another?

<sup>21</sup> And in that same hour he cured many of their infirmities and plagues, and of evil spirits; and unto many that were blind he gave sight. (Jesus performed many miracles in the sight of John's disciples)

<sup>22</sup>Then Jesus answering said unto them, Go your way, and tell John what things ye have seen and heard; how that the blind see, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, to the poor the gospel is preached. (Jesus is answering John's question. This is the First Advent) see Isaiah-29:18-19

(There will be a Second Advent – the Day of Vengeance; when God avenges those who have been hurt by Satan and the Kenites) see Isaiah-35:4-6

<sup>23</sup> And blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in me. (These are the true Christians. We love Jesus and follow His teachings)

(Today the scoffers and haters of Christ are all around. Atheists, communists and Muslims are taking over everywhere with the help of the corrupt media and Hollywood propaganda)

(Don't let them dissuade you. These nay-sayers will be held accountable for their actions. Christians will win in the end days of this Age)

<sup>24</sup> And when the messengers of John were departed, he began to speak unto the people concerning John, What went ye out into the wilderness for to see? A reed shaken with the wind? (A reed shaken in the wind is unstable. They go back and forth, whichever way the wind blows)

(John knew the truth in the Word of God. He could not be swayed by false teaching. He stayed true to God his whole life)

<sup>25</sup> But what went ye out for to see? A man clothed in soft raiment? Behold, they which are gorgeously apparelled, and live delicately, are in kings' courts. (These are the Pharisees and the Sadducees – who dress so holy. They teach traditions of men, and pass it off as religion. Their doctrine is vain and empty, without any substance)

<sup>26</sup> But what went ye out for to see? A prophet? Yea, I say unto you, and much more than a prophet. (John was a great prophet with a very special mission – to prepare the way for Messiah)

- <sup>27</sup> This is he, of whom it is written, Behold, I send my messenger before thy face, which shall prepare thy way before thee. (John's coming was prophesied in Malachi-3:1)
- <sup>28</sup> For I say unto you, Among those that are born of women there is not a greater prophet than John the Baptist: but he that is least in the kingdom of God is greater than he. (Although John was one of the greatest men of God, he was just a flesh man. Flesh and blood is less than the least of us who are in our spiritual body)
- <sup>29</sup> And all the people that heard him, and the publicans, justified God, being baptized with the baptism of John. (These were new Christians)
- <sup>30</sup> But the Pharisees and lawyers rejected the counsel of God against themselves, being not baptized of him. (These are Kenites in priest's robes, as well as the Jews who were in it for the money)

(Malachi = my messenger <in the Hebrew>) see Malachi-4:3-6

(John was a type for Elijah. He prepared the way for Jesus as Messiah. Elijah will return in the end days. He will prepare the way for Jesus' return as Lord of lords, King of kings)

<sup>31</sup> And the Lord said, Whereunto then shall I liken the men of <u>this</u> <u>generation</u>? and to what are they like? (Generation = progeny - better translation)

(Jesus is referring to the Pharisees < & Kenites>, who reject the Word of God)

- <sup>32</sup> They are like unto children sitting in the marketplace, and calling one to another, and saying, We have piped unto you, and ye have not danced; we have mourned to you, and ye have not wept. (They are play actors hypocrites, looking for followers. They preach false doctrine to each other, looking to get rich from tithes)
- <sup>33</sup> For John the Baptist came neither eating bread nor drinking wine; and ye say, He hath a devil. (They had nothing good to say about John. They have nothing good to say about Christians today)
- <sup>34</sup>The Son of man is come eating and drinking; and ye say, Behold a gluttonous man, and a winebibber, <u>a friend of publicans and sinners!</u> (They had nothing good to say about Jesus. They would say "Of course He is a friend to publicans and sinners." What they fail to

realize is that Jesus was sent in order to give the sinners a chance at redemption)

<sup>35</sup> But wisdom is justified of all her children. (The wise see through the Kenites and their pathetic attempt at deception)

Proverbs-1:7 (Wisdom comes from God and from the reverence of God) Also see Proverbs-8 (Wisdom speaks)

- <sup>36</sup> And one of the Pharisees desired him that he would eat with him. And he went into the Pharisee's house, and sat down to meat. (Jesus came to teach whosoever is willing to learn, and to believe; even to the Pharisees)
- <sup>37</sup> And, behold, a woman in the city, which was a sinner, when she knew that Jesus sat at meat in the Pharisee's house, brought an alabaster box of ointment,
- <sup>38</sup> And stood at his feet behind him weeping, and began to wash his feet with tears, and did wipe them with the hairs of her head, and kissed his feet, and anointed them with the ointment. (She came to anoint Jesus with the ointment. She was preparing Him for His crucifixion and burial. She was asking for forgiveness for her sins)
- <sup>39</sup> Now when the Pharisee which had bidden him saw it, he spake within himself, saying, This man, if he were a prophet, would have known who and what manner of woman this is that toucheth him: <u>for she is a sinner</u>. (Jesus read his mind This "holy Joe" looks down on other people. He is an egotist. He lacks compassion for other people. He is a bigger sinner than this woman)
- <sup>40</sup> And Jesus answering said unto him, Simon, I have somewhat to say unto thee. And he saith, Master, say on. (Master = teacher better translation)

(This was the Pharisees method of operation. They flattered Jesus while they were looking for a reason to frame Him; so that they could have Him executed)

(Satan works the same way. He will flatter you while he leads you to your death – physically and spiritually)

- <sup>41</sup> There was a certain creditor which had two debtors: the one owed five hundred pence, and the other fifty. (A parable; Jesus is trying to wake this guy up to what he is doing)
- <sup>42</sup> And when they had nothing to pay, he frankly forgave them both. Tell me therefore, which of them will love him most?
- <sup>43</sup> Simon answered and said, I suppose that he, to whom he forgave most. And he said unto him, Thou hast rightly judged.
- <sup>44</sup> And he turned to the woman, and said unto Simon, Seest thou this woman? I entered into thine house, thou gavest me no water for my feet: but she hath washed my feet with tears, and wiped them with the hairs of her head. (People wore sandals. It was customary to offer water to guests so they could wash their feet when entering someone's house)
- <sup>45</sup>Thou gavest me no kiss: but this woman since the time I came in hath not ceased to kiss my feet.
- <sup>46</sup> My head with oil thou didst not anoint: but this woman hath anointed my feet with ointment. (Christ = Christos < Greek > means the anointed one)
- <sup>47</sup> Wherefore I say unto thee, Her sins, which are many, are forgiven; for she loved much: but to whom little is forgiven, the same loveth little. (She had faith in Jesus that He could forgive her sins)
- <sup>48</sup> And he said unto her, Thy sins are forgiven.
- 49 And they that sat at meat with him began to say within themselves, Who is this that forgiveth sins also? (The Kenites were constantly looking for a reason to set Jesus up; so that they could kill Him)
- 50 And he said to the woman, Thy faith hath saved thee; go in peace.
