2 Samuel 8

King James Version (KJV)

(The mighty acts of David and the wars that he fought)

8 And after this it came to pass that David smote the Philistines, and subdued them: and David took Methegammah out of the hand of the Philistines. (Methegammah = the Bridle of Ammah - another name for Gath - the most powerful of the 5 Philistine major cities)

(Like a bridle controls the horse, so Gath controlled the direction of the other four major cities. By taking Gath, David had control over the Philistine empire)

²And he smote Moab, and measured them with a line, casting them down to the ground; even with two lines measured he to put to death, and with one full line to keep alive. And so the Moabites became David's servants, and brought gifts. (He put 1/2 of them to death<the males>. The rest <the females> became servants to Israel)

(David's great-grandmother <Ruth> was a Moabitess. She was the wife of Boaz; father of Obed; father of Jesse)

See Numbers-24:17 (God had judged Moab to death centuries earlier)

³ David smote also Hadadezer, the son of Rehob, king of <u>Zobah</u>, as he went <u>to recover his border</u> at the river Euphrates. (Zobah was a part of Syria)

(to recover his border = to cause the hand to cover <a Hebrew expression> - that means to take possession of)

⁴And David took from him a thousand chariots, and <u>seven hundred</u> <u>horsemen</u>, and twenty thousand footmen: and David <u>houghed</u> all the chariot horses, but reserved of them for an hundred chariots.

1Chronicles-8:4 (7,000 horsemen; this is more likely the number) (houghed- he hamstrung or destroyed the horses ability to run, to prevent a counter attack from the Syrians)

⁵ And when the Syrians of Damascus came to <u>succour</u> Hadadezer king of Zobah, David slew of the Syrians two and twenty thousand men. (<u>succour</u> = protect, rescue)

Then David put <u>garrisons</u> in Syria of Damascus: and the Syrians became servants to David, and <u>brought gifts</u>. And the LORD preserved David whithersoever he went. (Garrisons were military outposts set up to keep an eye on the population) (brought gifts = paid tribute and taxes)

(God gave David victory after victory over his enemies)

- ⁷And David took the shields of gold that were on the servants of Hadadezer, and brought them to Jerusalem. (David was gathering precious metals for the future construction of the temple by Solomon)
- ⁸ And from Betah, and from Berothai, cities of Hadadezer, king David took exceeding much brass. (This brass was later used by Solomon to make the brazen sea in front of the temple. It was also used the two main brass pillars in the temple) 1Chronicles-18:8
- ⁹When Toi king of <u>Hamath</u> heard that David had smitten all the host of Hadadezer, (Hamath was a center of commerce of the Kenites) see 2Chronicles-2:55 and Amos-6:14
- ¹⁰ Then Toi sent Joram his son unto king David, to salute him, and to bless him, because he had fought against Hadadezer, and smitten him: for Hadadezer had wars with Toi. And Joram brought with him vessels of silver, and vessels of gold, and vessels of brass: (Joram is called Hadaram in Chronicles. His name was changed by Toi to make Joram sound more like an Israelite)

NOTE: (This is more of the same old back stabbing deception by the Kenites. They buy peace with whoever is dominant at the time. The kenites are still around today – working as bankers, builders of cities, and as merchants) See Genesis-4

NOTE: (It is also believed that Judas Iscariot was a Kenite. The Kenites infiltrated Israel and later intermarried with them in the Book of Joshua. Later, in the Book of Kings, they had become the scribes and record keepers

bankers> for Israel)

¹¹ Which also <u>king David did dedicate unto the LORD</u>, with the silver and gold that he had dedicated of all nations which he subdued; (He was collecting material for the building of the temple)

- ¹² Of Syria, and of Moab, and of the children of Ammon, and of the Philistines, and of Amalek, and of the spoil of Hadadezer, son of Rehob, king of Zobah.
- ¹³ And David gat him a name when he returned from smiting of the Syrians in the valley of salt, being eighteen thousand men.
- ¹⁴ And he put garrisons in Edom; throughout all Edom put he garrisons, and all they of Edom became David's servants. And the LORD preserved David whithersoever he went. (Taking these lands allowed Israel to have seaports on the northern end of the Red Sea the Gulf of Acaba)

(There was no Suez Canal at that time. These ports gave Israel access to the lands of Africa. Solomon would later launch ships from there to trade in precious goods and a great deal of gold from Ophir)

¹⁵ And David reigned over all Israel; and David executed judgment and justice unto all his people. (He was a fair and just king)

(These were the high ranking officers in David's kingdom)

- ¹⁶ And Joab the son of Zeruiah was over the host; and Jehoshaphat the son of Ahilud was recorder; (recorder historian, the writer of Chronicles) (Joab was the general of the armies of Israel)
- ¹⁷ And <u>Zadok</u> the son of Ahitub, and <u>Ahimelech</u> the son of Abiathar, were the priests; and Seraiah was the <u>scribe</u>; (scribe-accountant, book keeper)

(Zadok & Ahimelech – two high priests at this time. Zadok from Saul's reign was with the Mosaic Tabernacle in Gibea. Ahimelech was appointed by David when he only ruled Judah. Zadok would later become the high priest of all of Israel)

¹⁸ And Benaiah the son of Jehoiada was over both the <u>Cherethites</u> and the <u>Pelethites</u>; and David's sons were <u>chief rulers</u>. (chief rulers = princes of the kingdom)

(Benaiah was one of David's "might thirty" in Chronicles. Cherethites were executioners – they executed laws and judgments of David throughout the land. Pelethites were couriers or messengers)
