Judges 4

King James Version (KJV)

4 And the children of Israel again <u>did evil</u> in the sight of the LORD, when Ehud was dead. (did evil – in Hebrew the manuscripts is – they did THE evil = idolatry- worship of false gods)

(They worshipped the idol gods of the Canaanites. God hates idolatry and idol worshippers. Once again, they abandoned God after their troubles had ended. They went right back into the greatest sin – idol worship)

NOTE: (Today, we, as a nation, also do the evil. The liberals have stopped the teaching of Christianity in public schools. Instead, they teach trans-sexualism as a lifestyle. They smear Christians and call us "right wing extremists"; because we choose moral correctness over political correctness)

²And the LORD sold them into the hand of <u>Jabin king of Canaan</u>, that reigned in Hazor; the captain of whose host was Sisera, which dwelt in Harosheth of the Gentiles. (Jabin is thought to be a title, not a name. In Joshua-11, Joshua also defeated a Jabin, over 100 years earlier)

(The Canaanites had rebuilt their cities because Israel did not completely wipe them out, as God had commanded them. Disobey God and you will pay the price)

³ And the children of Israel cried unto the LORD: for he had nine hundred chariots of iron; and twenty years he mightily oppressed the children of Israel. (They had abandoned God, so He left them)

(Chariots of iron had 2 foot long knife blades attached to the wheels. These knives would spin with the wheels. This was used to kill footmen of the enemy army)

⁴And Deborah, <u>a prophetess</u>, the wife of Lapidoth, she <u>judged Israel</u> at that time. (Debrorah = a bee <Hebrew>) (judge = to set things right with God and to rule the people)

(Deborah was the fourth judge. She was a prophetess as well as a judge. God spoke to her)

⁵And she dwelt under the palm tree of Deborah between Ramah and Bethel in mount Ephraim: and the children of Israel came up to her for judgment. (That is a different Deborah)

(Rebecca had a nurse named Deborah. It is thought that she was buried under that palm tree - so the name of that palm tree) see Genesis-35:8-on

NOTE: (Like Moses, Deborah only heard the most important disputes between people. There were other officials who heard the day to day disputes)

⁶ And she sent and called Barak the son of Abinoam out of Kedeshnaphtali, and said unto him, Hath not the LORD God of Israel commanded, saying, Go and draw toward mount Tabor, and take with thee ten thousand men of the children of Naphtali and of the children of Zebulun? (God no doubt gave Deborah the plan of attack. She was a prophetess)

⁷And I will draw unto thee to the river <u>Kishon</u>, Sisera, the captain of Jabin's army, with his chariots and his multitude; and I will deliver him into thine hand. (God chose the place for this battle. There is a good reason for this)

(Kishon = hard ground <in the Hebrew>. This would normally sound like a bad strategy for Israel. Hard ground should have been perfect for the chariots of the Canaanites. But God can control nature. HE created it. He can use it as He pleases)

*And <u>Barak</u> said unto her, <u>If thou wilt go with me, then I will go</u>: but if thou wilt not go with me, then I will not go. (Barak = a flashing sword) (Barak was afraid of the enemy. He wants Deborah to go first)

NOTE: (This guy sounds like Barrack Obama who wanted to "lead from behind". Those were his words, which he stated publicly)

And she said, I will surely go with thee: notwithstanding the journey that thou takest shall not be for thine honour; for the LORD shall sell Sisera into the hand of a woman. And Deborah arose, and went with Barak to Kedesh. (Deborah is prophesying - the woman in her prophecy is not Deborah)

(Jael will kill Sisera – God will again use the physically weak to destroy the strong. An unarmed woman in her tent will kill a mighty warrior in all of his armor and weapons)

- ¹⁰ And Barak called Zebulun and Naphtali to Kedesh; and he went up with ten thousand men at his feet: and Deborah went up with him.
- ¹¹ Now <u>Heber the Kenite</u>, which was of the children of <u>Hobab the father in law of Moses</u>, had severed himself from <u>the Kenites</u>, and pitched his tent unto the plain of Zaanaim, which is by Kedesh. (This verse is terribly inaccurate Heber had lived in the land of Kenites. He was not a Kenite. If he had been a Kenite he could not have severed himself from his own race. It makes no sense)

(Hobab, the son of Jethro, was the brother-in-law of Moses. Ruhiel was his name; Jethro was his title. He was Moses' father in law. They were a family of Medianite priests who only lived in the land of Kenites)

(Medianites were the descendants of Medan – the son of Abraham by his second wife Keturah. If Heber had been a Kenite by heritage, he could not have severed himself from them. He simply moved out of their land, and lived in the Promised Land with Israel. He was Jael's husband)

- ¹² And <u>they shewed Sisera</u> that Barak the son of Abinoam was gone up to mount Tabor. (Sisera had spies keeping an eye on Israel a good military tactic. Israel led Sisera where they wanted him, by God's plan)
- ¹³ And Sisera gathered together all his chariots, even nine hundred <u>chariots of iron</u>, and all the people that were with him, from Harosheth of the Gentiles unto the river of <u>Kishon</u>. (Kishon = hard ground) (Chariots of iron chariots that had 24 inch sharp knife blades attached to the wheels. They would drive through infantry men and cut them to pieces)

(Sisera liked this location because chariots are heavy and need solid ground to maneuver upon. He believed that Barak had made a strategic error. God chose this place <through Deborah > because He intends to turn the tables against Sisera)

¹⁴ And Deborah said unto Barak, Up; for this is the day in which the LORD hath delivered Sisera into thine hand: is not the LORD gone out before thee? So Barak went down from mount Tabor, and ten

thousand men after him. (God went out before him. That ensured his victory)

¹⁵ And the LORD <u>discomfited</u> Sisera, and all his chariots, and all his host, with the edge of the sword before Barak; so that Sisera lighted down off his chariot, and fled away on his feet. (Discomfited = destroyed by supernatural power)

(God can control nature. HE turned the hard ground into mud by flooding the river. Sesera's chariots sank into the mud and were stuck hard, as were his footmen. It is documented in Chapter-5)

(Sisera is running for his life. His army is mired in deep mud)

¹⁶ But Barak pursued after the <u>chariots</u>, and after the host, unto Harosheth of the Gentiles: and all the host of Sisera fell upon the edge of the sword; and there was not a man left. (Chariots can also be translated teams <of horses>. After the chariots were stuck in the mud, they probably unhitched the horses so they could get away on them. Apparently the horses couldn't get unstuck either)

¹⁷ Howbeit Sisera fled away on his feet to the tent of Jael the wife of <u>Heber the Kenite</u>: for there was peace between Jabin the king of Hazor and the house of <u>Heber the Kenite</u>. (Not Kenites by race, only by habitation. They were Medianites)

(Sisera thought this would be a safe place to rest. To enter a woman's tent, when the husband was absent was also punishable by death at this time)

- ¹⁸ And Jael went out to meet Sisera, and said unto him, Turn in, my lord, turn in to me; fear not. And when he had turned in unto her into the tent, she covered him with <u>a mantle</u>. (Mantle = A heavy blanket or a rug) (Jael was the wife of Heber. She was also a Medianite a descendant of Medan)
- ¹⁹ And he said unto her, Give me, I pray thee, a little water to drink; for I am thirsty. And she opened a bottle of milk, and gave him drink, and covered him. (The warm milk would help him fall asleep)
- ²⁰ Again he said unto her, Stand in the door of the tent, and it shall be, when any man doth come and enquire of thee, and say, Is there any man here? that thou shalt say, No. (Sisera knows that Barak and his men are looking for him)

²¹ Then Jael Heber's wife took a nail of the tent, and took an hammer in her hand, and went softly unto him, and smote the nail into his temples, and fastened it into the ground: for he was fast asleep and weary. So he died. (Jael drove the tent peg through Sisera's temples while he slept)

NOTE: (Typically, the men were out tending and protecting the flocks. The women were in charge of putting the tents up and taking them down when the family would move on to better pastures. Jael knew how to handle these tools)

- ²² And, behold, as Barak pursued Sisera, Jael came out to meet him, and said unto him, Come, and I will shew thee the man whom thou seekest. And when he came into her tent, behold, Sisera lay dead, and the nail was in his temples. (God uses whoever He wants to use in order to accomplish His plan) 1Corinthians-1:27
- ²³ So God subdued on that day Jabin the king of Canaan before the children of Israel. (He used Deborah and Jael to do it)
- ²⁴ And the hand of the children of Israel prospered, and prevailed against Jabin the king of Canaan, until they had destroyed Jabin king of Canaan. (Will Israel learn their lesson and remain loyal to God? No they won't. They will fall away from God, back to idolatry again)
